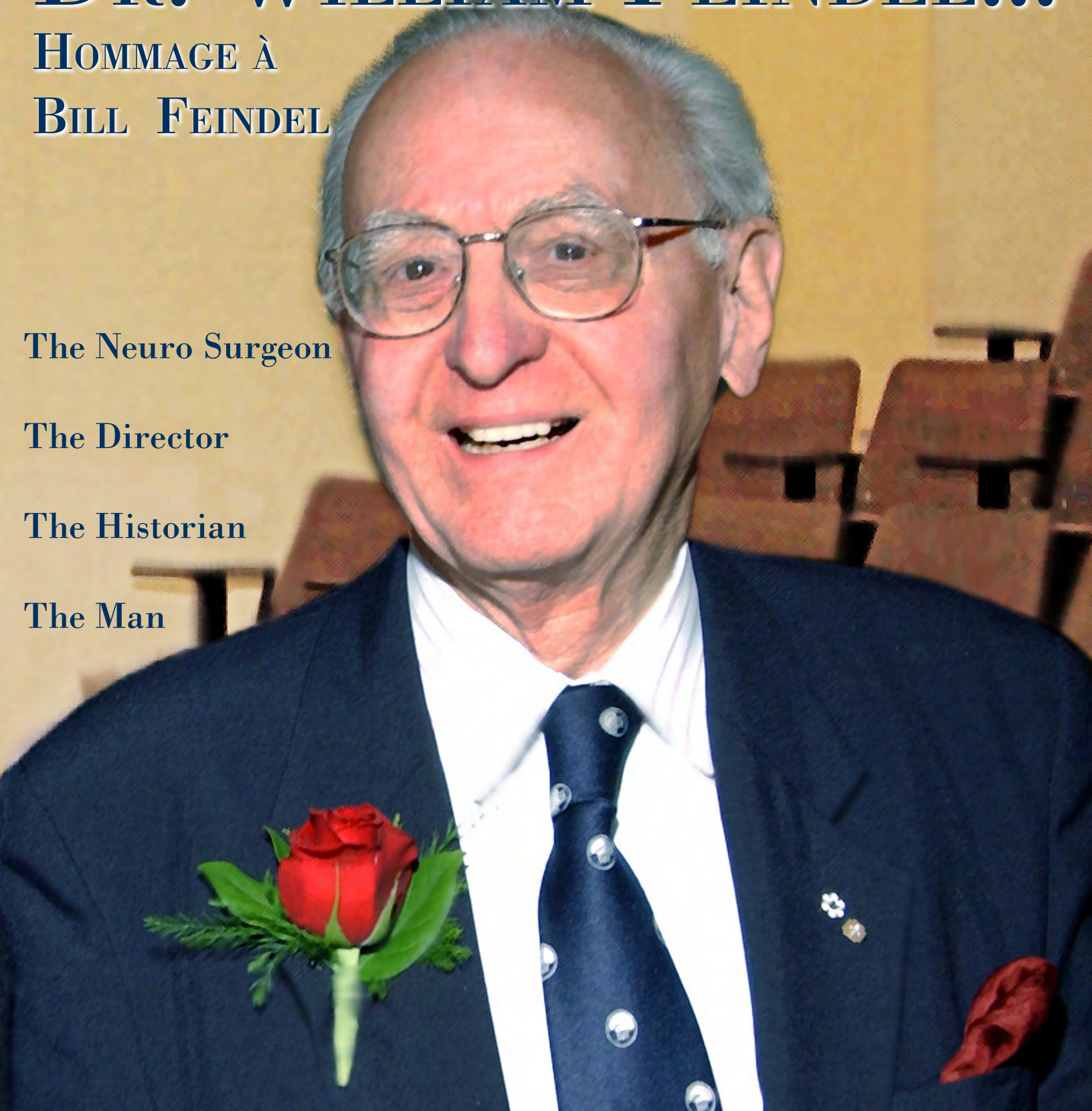

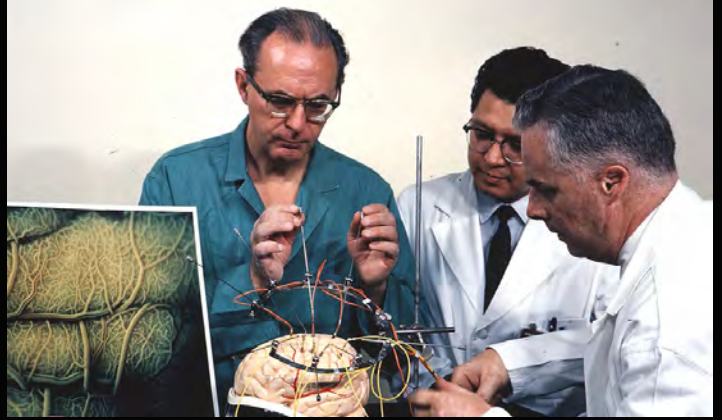

DENIS MELANÇON

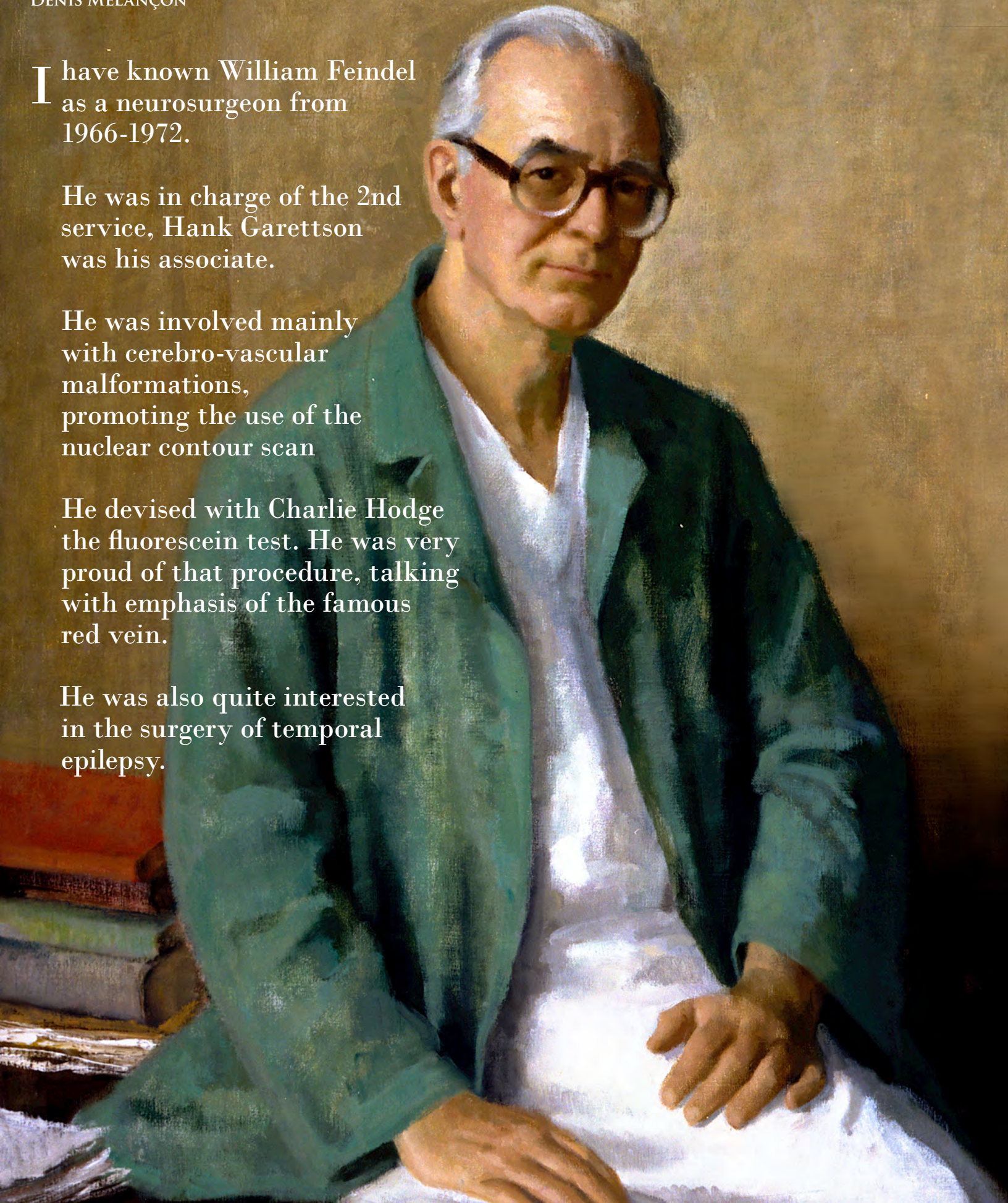
I have known William Feindel as a neurosurgeon from 1966-1972.

He was involved mainly with cerebro-vascular malformations, promoting the use of the nuclear contour scan

He devised with Charlie Hodge the fluorescein test. He was very proud of that procedure, talking with emphasis of the famous red vein.

He was also quite interested in the surgery of temporal epilepsy.

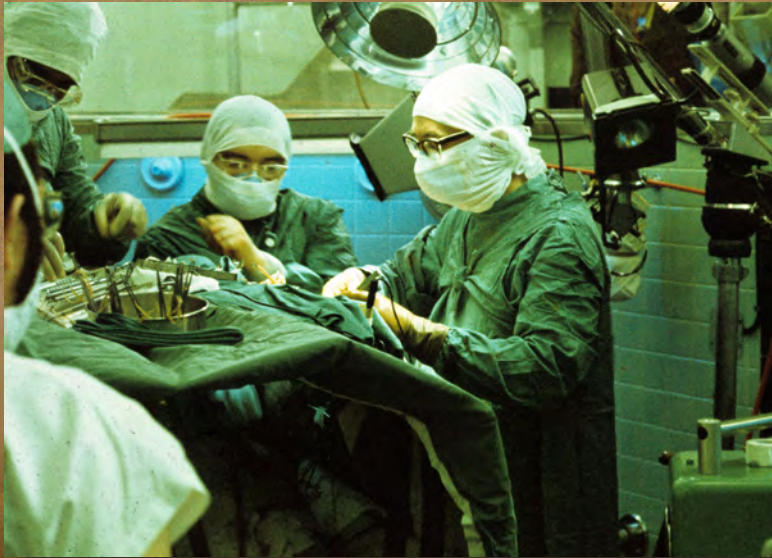

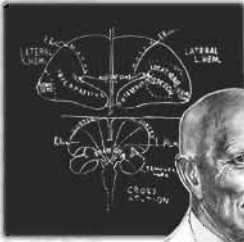
